• Etiquette

During the last two years, at the beginning of some sessions, Trevor and John have spoken about various aspects of etiquette.

Just a few reminders:

- \circ Be quiet and still when a player is preparing to stroke the ball
- \circ $\;$ Keep discussions quiet and to a minimum $\;$
- Where possible move promptly to your ball for your next turn unless it lies ahead of play
- Ask players, from either game when double-banked, to stand clear of your line of sight particularly when attempting a clearing shot
- In double-banked games be aware of the state of play of the other game. Be prepared to mark balls when requested. Use good judgement when games need to be stopped because they are crossing between hoops.

• 2021 Croquet NSW Golden Mallet Award

The 2021 Golden Mallet Award was awarded jointly to Barb Piggott, from Urunga, and Marion Davies, from Toronto. This is awarded for exceptional contributions and achievements to croquet during the year.

Advantage Golf Croquet for handicap play

It does away with having extra strokes that often cause higher handicapped players stress. Handicaps are used to determine starting scores. It appears to be a fairer method for players of all levels.
